

A Bibliography of Editions of *Narrative of the Adventures and Escape of Moses Roper, from American Slavery* (1837–1849)

Headnote

This bibliography was initially compiled in January 2024 to accompany our article “Black Bibliography as Biographical Method: The Publication History of *Narrative of the Adventures and Escape of Moses Roper, from American Slavery, 1837–1849*,” *Papers of the Bibliographical Society of America* 118, no.1 (March 2024): 47–78, <https://doi.org/10.1086/728990>. The research for this bibliography was conducted using the digitized versions of the book available to us through a variety of online repositories such as Hathi Trust, Google Books, Archive.org, and others. We had research assistants view and photograph physical copies at Kent State University Library (London 1840, 4th ed.) and Hull History Centre (London 1842, 4th ed. variant). Our graduate student, Genevieve Johnson-Smith, checked physical copies some of the Welsh editions. The only physical copy that we did examine is the London 1841, which is owned by Fionnghuala Sweeney (and, so far as we know, does not exist anywhere else). Using digitized versions of books presented considerable challenges. Obviously, it was impossible to address details such as bindings, paper type, and so on, but it also made the signature statements less certain than they might have been had we been able to consult physical copies. It is sometimes unclear whether all the blank pages were captured in the digitising process, and in some cases, it was microfiche that was digitised rather than the physical book itself, adding another layer of uncertainty. There are also some editions and impressions which are attested to in other sources which we have either not been able to access because they have not been available in physical copies or, such as in the case of the American Boston edition, have only been referred to by other sources with no record (that we could find) of a physical copy in any library. Given the size and nature of the book, it seems likely to us that some copies may exist bound with other pamphlets and not separately cataloged. It is almost certain that there are other copies in the hands of private collectors and, quite possibly, still in the families of those who purchased the nearly forty thousand copies of the various editions which were printed between 1837 and 1849.

It is our intent in this bibliography of Roper's *Narrative* to highlight those features that differentiate the various known editions and impressions to help researchers identify copies that they might encounter. We also hope to encourage other researchers to explore how the various versions of Roper's *Narrative* might parallel different versions of other anti-slavery narratives. Published between early July and early October 1839 and advertised with a price of 2s. 6d.

This differs from the London 1838 (2nd ed.) in a number of significant ways. It is the first to feature Roper's portrait, engraved by John Cochran from a now-lost painting by Henry Room. The advertisement for the 2nd ed. has been replaced by an introduction for this edition, which Roper signs as "Libertus" rather than "Moses Roper." The text has been broken into chapters. This is the first appearance of Mary B. Tuckey's poem, "Lines written on the occasion of the escape to England of Mr. Moses Roper, Late an American Slave—now a Freeman of Great Britain," which continues through nearly all subsequent editions. It also contains extensive appendices of other documents and information relating to slavery, as well as a list of subscribers and sales figures in various locations for the earlier editions.

The excerpt from Cowper’s “The Negro’s Complaint” is restored to the title page. The page number for page 31 is misprinted, with the second digit above the line.

We have designated this as the Sixth London Edition since it is substantially different than the previous edition, but there is no edition statement provided. This is a somewhat abbreviated version of London 1843 (5th ed.). It removes the footnote at the end of chapter 8, which requires repagination of the last several pages, and it also omits Tuckey’s poem. The portrait of Roper is placed after the title page instead of before. The contents list identifies the half-title as an inserted leaf, but it is not clear from examining the digital facsimile whether the half-title or the Roper portrait is the inserted leaf.

It is typeset in a more compact setting, with thirty lines per page in the main text, as opposed to twenty-three lines for London 1837, so it takes up fewer pages.
